Range Association of Municipalities & Schools Board Meeting Minutes Wednesday, May 31, 2023 - 6:00 P.M. Northeast Service Cooperative Building

Review and Approve Agenda:

The agenda was reviewed. A motion to approve the agenda was made by Weikum and supported by Kalmi. Motion carried.

Approve Meeting Minutes:

A motion to approve the regular meeting minutes from April 27, 2023, was made by Warwas and supported by Stolp. Motion carried.

Appearances:

The Board was joined by Jeff Anderson from Costin Group, MN to give a recap of this year's legislative session.

- This was a big year for the volume of bills and the level of activity from day one
- 22 major bills were passed and signed into law
- June 16 is the deadline to get new applications in for consideration for the next round of bonding
- **TAXES**: Sen Hauschild was on the tax committee in the Senate, Rep Lislegard was on the tax committee in the House: Both served on the tax conference committee
 - A. Social Security: 80-85% Minnesotans will be exempt from tax on Social Security (Married earners making less than \$100k/annually, single head of household making less than \$78K/annually)
 - B. Direct rebate checks of \$260/person, with an additional \$260/dependent (up to three) will reach more than 2,562,300 Minnesotans
 - C. Child and working family tax credit: up to \$1,750 per child which will impact more than one million families and could reduce child poverty by 1/3
 - D. LGA/CPA: each program will receive an additional \$80M per year
 - E. Homestead Credit Refund was expanded (a one-time property tax refund increase) and an increase in funding and modernization of the Payment in Lieu of Taxes to help northern MN counties
 - F. Film Production Tax Credit: expanded to \$25M per biennium and extended until 2032
 - G. The Mineral Articles in the tax bills were authored by Rep Lislegard and Sen Hauschild and include several provisions for NE MN including sales tax exemptions for school construction, it

- authorizes the Commissioner of the IRRR to provide additional funding for school construction in several school districts, and funding for numerous projects on the Iron Range
- H. Sen Hauschild and Rep Lislegard included many one-time grants (\$6M) to local communities and non-profits from the Homestead account

BONDING:

- A. The last bonding bill was signed in October of 2020, after 5 special sessions
- B. Super majority needed for general obligation bonds
- C. A deal was made the Friday before the end of session
- D. On Sunday they passed the Capital Investment bill (general obligation and cash bonding)
- E. Included in the bill for NE MN was ATV trails, community centers, St James Pit and Canisteo Pit, water infrastructure, Giant's Ridge, statewide nursing homes, plus many more.

OTHER FUNDING:

- A. Legacy Bill: Voyageurs Nat'l Park clean water project \$2M
- B. Environment Bill: St Louis and Koochiching County ATV Trail development \$1.45M (dedicated account), Get Out More Grants (Crane Lake, Silver Bay, Redhead Mountain Bike Park), St Louis County Canyon Waste Campus project \$2M, and more
- C. LCCMR: Redhead Mountain Bike Park \$1.6M, Biwabik Recreation Facility \$1.3M, Silver Bay Trailhead \$1.97M, and more
- D. Transportation Bill: St Louis County HWY 53/Rock Ridge \$6M, Aurora Hwy reconstruction (\$3M); Lake County HWY 61 Two Harbors reconstruction (\$11M)

MINING:

A. Some anti-mining bills were introduced but didn't go anywhere.

TRANSPORTATION:

- A. Gas tax increase
- B. Increase in motor vehicle sales tax and annual car tab fees
- C. Delivery fee for deliveries over \$100

EDUCATION:

- A. The legislation will inject \$2.2B additional dollars into the state's PreK-12 schools over the next biennium.
- B. 4% increase to the base per pupil aid in 2024 and 2% increase in 2025, with successive years linked to inflation with a cap of 3%
- C. \$300M a year in special education funding
- D. \$60M a year to offset the cost of a recent mandate that hourly, seasonal workers are eligible for unemployment during the summer

LABOR:

- A. Paid Family Medical Leave: Begins 1-1-26, 12 weeks family, 12 weeks medical-20 week annual cap. \$700M to seed the program, payroll tax to be split between employers and employees
- B. Safe and Sick Time passed.

MARIJUANA:

- A. MN became the 23rd state to legalize recreational cannabis
- B. 20% of taxes collected will go to local municipalities, along with licensing fees

Director's Report:

Interim Director Giorgi continued to monitor the legislative session. The May 4th Itasca County Housing Summit was well attended. There will be a webinar in June related to housing as well.

Old Business:

A. Director Giorgi gave an update on the MERA lawsuit. There was a 74-page decision that sites the rules for nonferrous mining are largely protective but will investigate noise and light impacts around the BWCAW. This is considered a win for mining, stating that the rules for air and water are adequate. There will likely be a contested case hearing.

B. Discussion was held on a potential dues increase. Director Giorgi sent out a letter to the RAMS membership asking for feedback on an increase and received two comments from corporate members.

New Business:

- A. Long Term Disability Insurance for new Executive Director: 60% of salary, \$3500/month, savings if annual premium is paid in full (\$1035.32). Life Insurance (\$100,000) is a term life policy, 25 year term: \$335.11/year for 25 years
- B. Discussion was held on the letters of support that were sent on behalf of RAMS. A motion to approve a letter of support for EV charging stations was made by Friedlieb and supported by Berrini. Motion carried.
- C. A CD matured at Boundary Waters Bank. It made \$1,323.55.
- D. The audit review with the Finance Committee was scheduled for June 29th, 2023, at 5pm.

Board Member Updates:

Gary Friedlieb gave an update on the City of Virginia:

- Thank you to the Legislators and Lobbyists!
- Virginia Public Safety Project is the largest project happening right now, with demolition of the acquired properties taking place now
- Potential Marriot Hotel project next to the new Iron Trail Motors Event Center
- Downtown improvement grants: new restaurant, Social Haus Ax Throwing, the Tini Square building
 has been purchased by a developer with potential plans for retail and residential living space, along
 with grants for new doors, windows, roofs, etc
- The residential steam conversion is complete
- Street and alley projected are slated through 2024-2025
- The city has been approached by 2 housing developers seeking support for multi-unit affordable housing structures in the Midway area of Virginia
- The legislator awarded Virginia \$2M to offset the inflation to construction cost of the new Public Safety building, along with \$900K increase in LGA and \$365K sales tax exemption on the construction
- MN Task Force 2 Urban Search and Rescue team was awarded \$200K annual base budget for continued training as part of the public safety funding
- Silver Lake Trail improvement will commence this summer on the south side of the lake with the LCCMR funding
- US Steel has donated \$100K to fill the funding gap for a new Olcott Park arch entrance (Music in the Park every Tuesday)
- June 17-18 Land of the Loon

Finance Committee Report:

Kalmi reported on the Finance Committee Meeting held May 31, 2023:

- 1. Expenditures for the period of April 27-May 30, 2023, in the total amount of \$13,677.79.
- 2. Profit and Loss Budget vs Actual is far below at 30.7%.
- 3. Balance Sheet as of April 26, is \$425,856.72

A motion to accept the financial reports was made by Weikum and supported by Warwas. Motion carried.

Other: Director Giorgi attended the N/K school groundbreaking ceremony, very nice! NE MN Housing Forum Monday, June 12, 9am-noon via zoom. Wednesday, June 14th, Sec of State Steve Simon will be in the area meeting with businesses and community leaders at the RAMS office from 8:30-9:30am. The Stauber hearing was well attended. The incoming Executive Director Paul Peltier mentioned that he is excited to get started and offered his phone number, 218-431-1317.
